this book examines the role of popular culture in the construction of gendered identities in contemporary society it draws on a wide range of popular cultural forms including popular music newspapers and television to illustrate how femininity and masculinity are produced represented and consumed the authors blend primary and secondary research to offer the reader a balanced yet novel overview of the area students are introduced to key theories and concepts in the fields of gender studies and popular culture which are made accessible and interesting through their application to topical examples such as djs binge drinking and computer games the book is structured into three clear user friendly sections 1 production gender and popular culture an investigation of who produces popular culture why gendered patterns occur and how they impact on content 2 representation gender and popular culture an examination of how men and women are represented in contemporary popular culture and how notions of in appropriate femininity and masculinity are constructed 3 consumption gender and popular culture an exploration of who consumes what in popular culture how gendered consumption relates to space and what the effects of consuming representations of gender are gender and popular culture will be essential reading for students and scholars of media and cultural studies at all levels

this unique collection brings a rarely seen indigenous and global perspective to the study of gender and psychology within these chapters researchers who live and work in the countries and cultures they study examine gender based norms values expression and relations across diverse western and non western societies familiar as well as less covered locations and topics are analyzed including china new zealand israel turkey central america the experience of refugees and gendered health inequities across africa such as in the treatment of persons with hiv included too are examples of culturally appropriate interventions to address disparities and data on the extent to which these steps toward equality are working structurally the volume is divided into three sections the first two parts of the book take readers on a journey to different regions of the world to illustrate the most recent trends in research concerning gender issues and then outline present implications and future prospects for the psychological analysis of both gender culture the third section of the book has an applied perspective and focuses on the cultural norms and values reinforcing gender equality as well as cultural and social barriers to them a sampling of the topics covered sexual orientation across culture and time a broader conceptualization of sexism in poland an analysis of gender roles within the family in switzerland modern day dowries in south asian international arranged marriages the current state of gender equality in the united states of america socio cultural determinants of gender disparity in ghana psychology of gender through the lens of culture is a milestone toward core human rights and goals worldwide and a critical resource for psychologists sociologists anthropologists

the question of how boys become men or how girls become women may seem simple but the answers can be complex this new edition draws upon rich examples from research popular media and global accounts to explore how gender is produced consumed regulated and performed in young lives today

the twentieth century gave rise to profound changes in traditional sex roles this study reveals how modernization has changed cultural attitudes towards gender equality and analyzes the political consequences it systematically compares attitudes towards gender equality worldwide comparing almost 70 nations ranging from rich to poor agrarian to postindustrial this volume is essential reading to gain a better understanding of issues in comparative politics public opinion political behavior development and sociology

this book shows how different a focus on gender is from one on sex whether in scholarly thinking professional activity or public policy making it indicates how incorrect contemporary renditions of the difference between them is provides an explanation of this tension and difference based on the critical analysis of key institutions and shows the serious consequences of this confusion for women in particular across a wide range of institutional processes and practices in north america and western europe this confusion out of the failure to understand adequately the historical origins of sex as a civil designation in a political economy and in state taxation and census concerns and the corollary determination of spokesmen for the emerging capitalist and industrial nation state to extirpate the last vestiges of gender given its tie to a pre industrial kinship system found in towns and local communities this is a forcefully written study which integrates material from a vast range of disciplines and professional practices it also seeks to integrate salient work in women s and feminist studies into a critique of key institutions and practices if advacned

industrial societies it uses critical theory and makes this available to students and practitioners as well as scholars and academics

psychology's study of women has revealed some themes that span cultures and countries yet women's lived experiences in different cultures can be dramatically different this element explores from a psychological perspective women's issues in cultural contexts beginning with the question of public and private identity i.e. who counts as a woman it goes on to examine embodiment sexuality reproduction family roles economic participation and power violence leadership and feminist activism it concludes with a brief discussion of women's complicated relationship to culture as both keepers and sometimes prisoners of cultural traditions particularly in the context of migration to different cultures running through the element are two general themes the pervasiveness of a gender hierarchy that often privileges men over women and the ways in which women's lived experience varies within cultures according to the intersection of gender with other categories that affect expectations norms power and privilege

between 1700 and 1830 men and women in the english speaking territories framing the atlantic gained unprecedented access to material things the british atlantic was an empire of goods held together not just by political authority and a common language but by a shared material culture nourished by constant flows of commodities diets expanded to include exotic luxuries such as tea and sugar the fruits of mercantile and colonial expansion homes were furnished with novel goods like clocks and earthenware teapots the products of british industrial ingenuity this groundbreaking book compares these developments in britain and north america bringing together a multi disciplinary group of scholars to consider basic questions about women men and objects in these regions in asking who did the shopping how things were used and why they became the subject of political dispute the essays show the profound significance of everyday objects in the eighteenth century atlantic world

soon after its publication in 1973 fear of flying brought erica jong immense popular success and media fame alternately pegged sassy and vulgar jong s novel embraced the politics of the women s liberation movement and challenged the definition of female sexuality yet today more than twenty years and several books later literary reputation continues for the most part to elude jong typecast by her adversaries as a media seeking sensationalist erica jong has been unfairly side stepped by academia charlotte templin contends in this carefully researched study augmented by personal interviews with jong templin assembles and analyzes the medley of responses to jong s books by reviewers critics writers academics and the media by liberals conservatives and feminists she examines the diverse opinions on the merit and relevance to contemporary life of fear of flying the invocation of a high culture low culture dichotomy to discredit how to save your own life the anatomy of literary success with fanny jong s reception in a postfeminist age and the trivialization of jong s works that is inevitable with mass media exposure templin also shows how antagonistic reviewers tend to identify jong with her fictitious characters a practice more common when the author is a woman and judge her to be guilty of the sin of not being a proper woman in turn she shows how reviewers reveal something of their own values and ideological biases in their critiques and how literary reputations are built destroyed and altered over time the first book to make a detailed examination of the reputation of a woman writer feminism and the politics of literary reputation provides an excellent case study for the literary reception of women writers within a broad cultural context templin s analysis offers valuable insight into the reception of women writers especially commercially successful women writers and dramatically illustrates the relation of literary reputation to popular appeal and cultural mores

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
